

#### VICAR'S PONDERABLES – NOVEMBER 2025

#### A Note from the Vicar



"This message is not a novel invention of ours but the very ancient, approved teaching of the apostles brought to light again. Neither have we invented a new Baptism, Sacrament of the Altar, Lord's Prayer, and Creed; nor do we desire to know or to have anything new in Christendom. We only contend for, and hold to, the ancient: that which Christ and the apostles have left behind them and have given to us." (Luther, Exposition on John, 1537)

Reformation Sunday brings to mind both the power of tradition and the need for renewal. It was on 31 October 1517, 508 years ago, that a 33-year-old Augustinian monk, sent a list of 95 propositions to Archbishop Albrecht of Mainz challenging the Catholic Church's practice of selling indulgences and calling for theological debate on repentance and grace (sidebar: there is no direct evidence that Luther personally nailed the 95 theses to the church door in Wittenberg, although it very well could have happened). His actions and what followed set in motion the *Protestant Reformation*. By 1519, followers of Luther were negatively labeled as https://pstrykken.com/wp-content/uploads/2025/10/martin-luthertraditional.jpg?w=105"Lutherans" (picture opponents sneering) by those opposed to what Luther was doing — a name that eventually stuck. Luther preferred the term "Evangelical" to describe the movement. A few more details for background: Luther's act of conscience challenging church doctrine led to his eventual excommunication by *Pope Leo X (1513-1521)* after his refusal to recant his positions at a meeting known as the Diet of Worms four years after his initial actions. Further, he was declared a heretic and outlaw by *Charles V*, Holy Roman Emperor, meaning anyone could legally capture or kill him without consequence. Protected by *Elector* Frederick of Saxony, Luther was spirited away to Wartburg Castle where he began translating the New Testament into German. In 1525, Luther married Katharina von Bora (1499-1552), a Cistercian nun who fled the convent. Talk about a rebellious power couple!

How should we view all of this from our 21st Century vantage point? It's important to realize that Luther did not set out to break with Roman Catholicism. In fact, one can argue that he saw his actions as returning the Church to its ancient roots, as noted in the introductory quote. After all, Luther was steeped in the writings of Augustine (354-430), especially on sin, grace, predestination, and faith. He cited Augustine more than any other non-biblical source and even annotated Augustine's texts by hand. Most notably, Luther fiercely rejected <u>Pelagianism</u>, believing that human will was bound by sin and incapable of choosing God without divine grace. His stance was shaped by his Augustinian training, which emphasized the total dependence of the soul on God's mercy. Luther taught that salvation comes not through effort or merit, but through faith alone—a gift initiated by God, not earned by humans. In this view, Pelagianism was not just error but spiritual pride, denying the depth of human need and the power of grace. As Lutherans, we can summarize Luther's theology with the following phrases: Sola Fide (faith alone), Sola Scriptura (scripture alone), Sola Gratia (grace alone), Solus Christus (Christ alone), and Soli Deo Gloria (To God alone be the glory). To use a football analogy — ala Vince Lombardi — this is the "power sweep" of Lutheranism.

### FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

#### Roger L. Kurtz

Invite your family and friends to attend a recital in our nave featuring Duo Harpyn on Sunday, November 9<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 p.m. Flutist Lois Bliss Herbine and Harpist Rong Tan, who both live in the suburban Philadelphia area, will present a varied and enjoyable program of music for flute and harp. (Herbine has ties to the Lititz area, with her mother-in-law residing at Luther Acres and her sister-in-law living only a half mile from the retirement community.)

Lois Herbine enjoys a varied musical career as a soloist and recording artist, a chamber and orchestral musician, and a respected teacher and clinician. A native of the Philadelphia area, she earned her Bachelor of Music degree from the New School of Music, where she received the school's highest honors in performance and academic achievement. Herbine has performed piccolo with the Reading Symphony Orchestra for over twenty-five years and has played with dozens of other orchestras and ensembles in the tri-state area, including the Erie Philharmonic, the Ocean City Pops Orchestra, and the Fairmount Chamber Ensemble. She served for four years as the principal flutist for Peter Nero and the Philly Pops and the Mann Festival Orchestra, and has performed in soundtracks for numerous television and radio specials, theme music, and commercials. Herbine maintains an active teaching studio at her home and has given performance master classes at various schools and societies, including Baylor, Rice, and Temple Universities, and the University of Michigan. In the summer of 2024, she became the director of the new Philly Fife and Drum Company. Her corps has been invited to perform in America250PA celebratory events in Philadelphia, Easton, Lebanon, and Monroe County, PA.

Born in China, Rong Tan is an active chamber musician and freelancing harpist who resides in Cheltenham, PA. She has performed with the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Baltimore Symphony, the Chamber Orchestra of Philadelphia, the Philadelphia Ballet, the Philly Pops, Opera Philadelphia, and the Delaware Symphony Orchestra, and is currently the principal harpist of Opera Delaware. Tan started her piano studies at age seven and was admitted into the Central Conservatory of Music for gifted children at the age of thirteen to study harp. She graduated from the Curtis Institute of Music, where she was a student of Marilyn Costello, the former principal harpist of the Philadelphia Orchestra. Tan received the Curtis Institute of Music Award and won the Elizabeth Herbert Hobin Harp Competition. As a soloist, she has been featured with the National Repertory Orchestra, the Allegro Society, the Pennsylvania Pops, the Pottstown Symphony Orchestra, and the Bay Atlantic Symphony.

Highlights from the November 9<sup>th</sup> program will include the following works: *Flute Sonata No. 1 in F Major* by Benedetto Marcello, *Minuet and Dance of the Blessed Spirits* by Christoph Willibald Gluck, *The Fog is Lifting* by Carl Nielsen, *Entr'acte for Flute and Harp* by Jacques Ibert, *Claire de Lune* by Claude Debussy, *Pièce en Forme de Habanera* by Maurice Ravel, *Phantasy on Themes of Japanese Folk Songs* by Josef Molnár, *Méditation* from *Thaïs* by Jules Massenet, and an arrangement by Lois Herbine of John Legend's *All of Me.*

#### NOVEMBER PROPERTY COMMITTEE UPDATE

- 1. Prolawn here on 10/7/2025 to do Fall Lawn treatment.
- 2. M & E Roofing here on 10/9/2025 to replace shingles on Educational Wing. Shingles missing on portico roof replaced and hole noted in roof of accessibility wing which was also replaced.
- 3. Exterior Fall Cleanup took place on October 11, 2025. All bushes were trimmed, 2 trees in front of church building were thinned and dead wood removed, and weeding of entire church property completed! Thank you to Ken Craley, Mike Fetter, Zachary Fetter, Roger Kurtz and Brenda Fetter for a job well done.

What a legacy... not just 25 or so people but hundreds or thousands of people just because we used our treasures wisely to help the larger church.


