At the conclusion of the Peace, the congregation is seated.



EUCHARISTIC PRAYER

(The pre-filled cups contain grape juice.) Those who wish to receive only a blessing at the rail should indicate this by crossing their arms over their chest. As the ministers distribute the elements, they say these words: The body of Christ, given for you. **Amen.** The blood of Christ, shed for you. **Amen.**

MUSIC NOTES:

Adapted by Harrison Oxley (1933-2009), the following text of the offertory anthem is based on a translation by John Mason Neale (1818-1866) of verses from a Latin poem by Bernard of Cluny, a 12th-century French Benedictine monk: O sweet and blessed country, O Paradise of joy, eternal fount of radiance no evil can destroy! They stand those halls of Sion, all jubilant with song, and bright with many an angel and all the martyr throng: and there the throne of David, and there, from care released, the song of them that triumph, the shout of them that feast! The Prince is ever with them, the daylight is serene, the pastures of the blessed are decked in glorious sheen. What ecstasy of music within those courts is found! What glorious alleluias supernal choirs resound! Their psalms in holy chorus seraphic voices raise, and cherubim make answer in antiphons of praise. O home of fadeless splendor, of radiancy unpriced: O sweet and blessed country, thy cornerstone is Christ.

Organist and Master of Choristers at St. Edmundsbury Cathedral in England from 1958 to 1985, Oxley also provided the anthem's musical setting, which is an arrangement of "Thaxted" – a hymn tune by the English composer Gustav Holst (1874-1934). Holst originally wrote the stately theme as part of the "Jupiter" movement of his orchestral suite *The Planets*. In 1921, he adapted the melody to fit the patriotic poem "I Vow to Thee, My Country." It did not appear as a hymn tune named "Thaxted" until his friend Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) included it in the 1925 hymnal *Songs of Praise*. (Thaxted is the English village where Holst resided for much of his life.) The tune appears on page 880 of *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* set to the text "O God Beyond All Praising."

FIRST READING: Daniel 7:1-3, 15-18

In the first year of King Belshazzar of Babylon, Daniel had a dream and visions of his head as he lay in bed. Then he wrote down the dream: 2I, Daniel, saw in my vision by night the four winds of heaven stirring up the great sea, ³ and four great beasts came up out of the sea, different from one another.

15 As for me, Daniel, my spirit was troubled within me, and the visions of my head terrified me. 16I approached one of the attendants to ask him the truth concerning all this. So he said that he would disclose to me the interpretation of the matter: ¹⁷ "As for these four great beasts, four kings shall arise out of the earth. 18 But the holy ones of the Most High shall receive the kingdom and possess the kingdom forever-forever and ever."

SECOND READING: Ephesians 1:11-23

In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, 12so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. ¹³In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; 14this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

15 I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason 16I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. ¹⁷I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, 18 so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, 19 and what is the immeasurable greatness

of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. 20 God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, 21 far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. ²²And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, ²³which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

GOSPEL: Luke 6:20-31

Then [Jesus] looked up at his disciples and said:

"Blessed are you who are poor,

for yours is the kingdom of God. 21"Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be filled.

"Blessed are you who weep now,

for you will laugh.

²²"Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, revile you, and defame you on account of the Son of Man. 23 Rejoice in that day and leap for joy, for surely your reward is great in heaven; for that is what their ancestors did to the prophets.

24"But woe to you who are rich,

for you have received your consolation. 25"Woe to you who are full now,

for you will be hungry. "Woe to you who are laughing now,

for you will mourn and weep.

²⁶"Woe to you when all speak well of you, for that is what their ancestors did to the false prophets.

²⁷"But I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, 28 bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. 29If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. 30 Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. 31Do to others as you would have them do to you."
