Savior of the Nations come, virgin's son, make here your home. Marvel now, O heav'n and earth: God has chosen such a birth.

December is a busy time of the year. Many I meet in congregations are always busy, and this time of year brings even more things to do. I hope that in the midst of the business, we remember why we are busy. The many things we chose to do during this month are a part of our faith: sharing our faith in God's daily presence, anticipating in hope Christ's coming, expressing our love for family and others. Wanting all those things to be just right can make our running around on snowy and icy roads even more stressful.

In the midst of all that, I hope we can all at times, stop and take a breath, and center ourselves on the grace and love of God we know through the incarnation of God's promise. It is a strange story we tell: that God chose to take on human form, not in a context of material wealth and political power, but in the context of a young family from a small town who on the night of this blessed birth had no shelter but an animals' stable; that common shepherds and elite Magi both came to praise and worship the newborn infant.

We often look to the power of nations for answers to the world's problems, but in Jesus we have a new understanding of salvation for the nations. In Jesus, we have seen the power of selfless love, we have seen the inability of world power structures to inhibit this selfless love, and we have seen the all-embracing love of God that is extended to all nations or peoples. How many times do we see people in this world exclude others, but in God's Kingdom, no one is excluded.

At this time of year with short days, the darkness can feel overwhelming. We can be angry at or resigned to the injustices in the world, and the harm done to innocent people. We can be tired and sad from personal losses, especially losses of this year, but also losses that still sting from years past. We can be unhappy with our introspection and our personal failings. But despite these dark feelings, we are called in Advent to center ourselves on the light of Christ. The light still to come that breaks into our suffering, and the light already in us that empowers us to care for and share with others, and to follow Christ's example of selfless love.

Whatever the burdens you are carrying at this time may be, allow Christmas lights, seen in towns throughout the world at this time of year, remind you of and center you in the light of Christ in this world. God is in the world bringing healing, and redemption and making each of us a new creation. God's love in Christ, shines despite the heaviness we feel through our faith, our hope in the future and our actions of love for others.

Blessings to all the families of Jerusalem Lutheran Church in Rothsville and Brickerville United Lutheran Church in Brickerville during this Advent and Christmas season. Christ is both at the door, and already in your home.

Now your manger, shining bright, hallow night with newborn light Night cannot this light subdue; let our faith sine ever new.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

As we once again center our hearts and minds on Christ's coming during the four weeks of Advent, the hymnody and choral/organ music of our liturgies will proclaim the themes of anticipation, watchfulness, and joy found in the assigned readings. The following Hymns of the Day will be sung: 12/3 – Hark! A Thrilling Voice Is Sounding! (ELW #246); 12/10 – Comfort, Comfort Now My People (ELW #256); 12/17 – O Lord, How Shall I Meet You (ELW #241 with Valet will ich dir geben as the alternate tune); and 12/24 – Savior of the Nations, Come (ELW #263). Choral anthems will include In Night's Dim Shadows Lying by George Guest (12/3); Prepare the Way of the Lord by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (12/10); Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus by Robert A. Hobby (12/17); and The Angel Gabriel by Malcolm Archer (12/24). Organ voluntaries during Advent will include Improvisation on "Conditor Alme Siderum" by George Oldroyd and Chorale Prelude on "Herr Christ, der einge Gottes-Sohn" by Johann Sebastian Bach (12/3); Chorale Prelude on "Freu dich sehr" by Sigfrid Karg-Elert and Carillon on "Puer Nobis" by Richard Purvis (12/10); Two Chorale Preludes on "Valet will ich dir geben" by Georg Friedrich Kaufmann and Johann Sebastian Bach (12/17); and Chorale Prelude on "Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland" by Paul Manz (12/24).

As we look forward to celebrating Christ's birth on Christmas Eve, please note that a 20-minute prelude of music for choir and organ will precede the 7:00 p.m. liturgy. During the prelude, our Jerusalem Choir will sing *A Babe Is Born* by Adrian Lucas and *Softly the Stars Were Shining* by Adolf Torovsky. Organ voluntaries will include *Noël No. 10, Grand Jeu et Duo* by Louis-Claude Daquin, *Chorale Prelude on "In Dulci Jubilo"* by Marcel Dupré, and *Carol Prelude on "Greensleeves"* by Richard Purvis. The offertory anthem will be Hal H. Hopson's arrangement of the lively 16th-century Spanish carol *Riu, Riu, Chiu, Manger Birds Are Winging.* The service will conclude with Johann Sebastian Bach's *Chorale Fantasia on "In Dulci Jubilo"* played as the postlude. Percussionist Jeff Schreiber will provide timpani accompaniment for many of the carols, as well play tambourine for the offertory anthem.

Plan to attend the Service of Nine Lessons and Carols on December 31, the First Sunday of Christmas. If your favorite carol was not sung on Christmas Eve, chances are it will be this day since 11 hymns and carols will be part of the service! The story of the fall of humanity, the promise of the Messiah, and the birth of Jesus are told in nine short Bible readings from Genesis, the prophetic books and the Gospels, interspersed with the singing of Christmas carols and hymns by the congregation. The service originated at England's Truro Cathedral in 1878. Since 1928, the best-known version has been broadcast annually from King's College Chapel, Cambridge, on Christmas Eve. Even during the darkest days of World War II, the broadcasts continued uninterrupted despite the removal of the stained-glass windows and a total lack of heat in the building.
