PASTOR'S PONDERABLES - MAY 2021

Grandmother says....".Carrots, Eggs, or Coffee. Which are you?"

A young woman went to her grandmother and told her about her life and how things were so hard for her. She did not know how she was going to make it and wanted to give up. She was tired of fighting and struggling. It seemed as one problem was solved, a new one arose. Her grandmother took her to the kitchen.....She filled three pots with water. In the first, she placed carrots, in the second she placed eggs, and the last she placed ground coffee beans. She let them sit and boil without saying a word.

In about twenty minutes she turned off the burners. She fished the carrots out and placed them in a bowl. She pulled the eggs out and placed them in a bowl. Then she ladled the coffee out and placed it in a bowl. Turning to her granddaughter, she asked, "Tell me what do you see?"

"Carrots, eggs and coffee," she replied. She brought her closer and asked her to feel the carrots. She did and noted that they got soft. She then asked her to take an egg and break it. After pulling off the shell, she observed the hard-boiled egg. Finally, she asked her to sip the coffee. The granddaughter smiled, as she tasted its rich aroma. The granddaughter then asked, "What's the point, grandmother?"

Her grandmother explained that each of these objects had faced the same adversity - boiling water - but each reacted differently. The carrot went in strong, hard and unrelenting. However, after being subjected to the boiling water, it softened and became weak. The egg had been fragile. Its' thin shell had protected its liquid interior. But, after sitting through the boiling water, its inside became hardened. The ground coffee beans were unique, however. After they were in the boiling water, they had changed the water.

"Which are you?" she asked her granddaughter. "When adversity knocks on your door, how do you respond? Are you a carrot, an egg, or a coffee bean?"

Thank of this: Which am I? Am I the carrot that seems strong, but with pain and adversity, do I wilt and become soft and lose my strength? Am I the egg that starts with a malleable heart, but changes with the heat? Did I have a fluid spirit, but after a death, a breakup, a financial hardship or

some other trial, have I become hardened and stiff? Does my shell look the same, but on the inside am I bitter and tough with a stiff spirit and a hardened heart? Or am I like the coffee bean? The bean actually changes the hot water, the very circumstance that brings the pain. When the water gets hot, it releases the fragrance and flavor. If you are like the bean, when things are at their worst, you get better and change the situation around you. When the hours are the darkest and trials are their greatest, do you elevate to another level? - Author unknown

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

On May 23rd the Christian Church will celebrate Pentecost, a festival observed 50 days after Easter Sunday commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit on the disciples of Jesus following his Ascension. Both the organ prelude and postlude that day will feature a work based on “Creator Spirit, Heavenly Dove,” a hymn found on page 577 of *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* that many consider to be the quintessential Pentecost hymn.

Rhabanus Maurus (c. 780-856), the author of “Creator Spirit, Heavenly Dove,” was a Benedictine monk, teacher, and theologian who became Archbishop of Mainz in Germany. Prior to being ordained as a priest, Maurus was in charge of an abbey school in Fulda, Germany, that became one of the most important centers of scholarship and book production in Europe. “Creator Spirit, Heavenly Dove” is his best-known hymn. Since the 16th century, there have been more than 50 English-language translations and paraphrases of “Veni Creator Spiritus,” Maurus’ original Latin text. The version appearing in our current hymnal is a composite of several translations. Appropriate for Pentecost, the hymn is also sung for other occasions that focus on the Holy Spirit, including confirmation, the ordination of clergy, the consecration of bishops, and the dedication of churches. It is also traditionally sung on two monumental occasions: when the Cardinals enter the Sistine Chapel after a new pope has been elected, and before the anointing at every British monarch’s coronation ceremony since Charles I in 1625.

A set of four variations based on “Veni Creator Spiritus,” the medieval plainsong melody paired with Maurus’ text, will be offered as the prelude and postlude on May 23rd. Written in 1930 by the 20th-century French organist and composer Maurice Duruflé (1902-1986), the three variations presented as the prelude show the impressionistic influence of Gabriel Fauré, one of Duruflé’s teachers, while the fourth variation presented as the postlude is very much in the tradition of the great French organ toccatas. Duruflé was organist at St. Etienne-du-Mont in Paris from 1930 until 1975 and also served as Professor of Harmony at the Paris Conservatory from 1943 until 1969. As a composer, he was extremely self-critical and would only publish music that satisfied his own very high standards; consequently, his organ works, though few in number, rank among the best 20th-century compositions for the instrument.

This year marks the 50th anniversary of an extraordinary event in Lancaster city’s cultural life. On October 17, 1971, Duruflé and his wife, Marie-Madeleine, appeared in concert at First Presbyterian Church at the invitation of Reginald Lunt, the church’s Director of Music. During the first half of the program, the Duruflés performed organ works by Bach, Couperin, Clérambault, Buxtehude, Franck, and Tournemire. The second half of the program was a performance of Duruflé’s *Requiem*, which featured the composer as conductor and his wife as organ accompanist. A mass choir was comprised of singers from the First Presbyterian Chancel Choir, the Franklin and Marshall College Glee Club, the Lancaster Opera Workshop Chorus, and the Motet Choir of the Market Square Presbyterian Church, Harrisburg.

COVID CORNER - MAY 2021 - Updated guidelines for worshipping in a pandemic.

Here is an update of expectations at this time in relation to how we love our neighbor when we come to worship at Jerusalem Evangelical Lutheran Church:

1. Please wear a mask, except while receiving Holy Communion. (Extra masks are available if you have forgotten one or do not have one.)
2. Two people are invited to ride the elevator at one time.
3. Every other pew is roped off to respect physical (social) distancing. Family units may sit together, otherwise, parishioners will sit 6 feet apart.
4. Hand sanitizer is available at both the entry doors.
5. Everyone who assists with worship will wear gloves to keep everyone safe - ushers, Assisting Minister and pastor.
6. Flowers may once again be ordered in honor or memory of someone. But, the person who orders the flowers must retrieve them or make arrangements to have them removed from the chancel.
7. Offering plates are placed at the rear of the church for tithes and offerings. All those who will count the offerings after the service will wear gloves.
8. The ELCA Worship team has issued guidelines for returning to singing in church. The metric suggested is a threshold of 70% to 85% of the nation's population being fully vaccinated.
9. Holy Communion will be celebrated in a circle. Those sitting in the outer pews will be the first table, coming to the aisle next to them. Those sitting in the center set of pews will be the second table. Those sitting on the lectern side moving to the aisle closest to them and those sitting on the pulpit side moving to the aisle closest to them. The Pastor and Assisting Ministers will bring communion to you moving around the circle.
10. The Pastor will use tongs to give you a wafer in your cupped hands. The Assisting Minister will hand you a pre-filled glass of wine or grape juice.

STAINED GLASS WINDOW RENOVATIONS


A rich history accompanies the beauty of stained glass windows. Staining glass dates back to the Roman Empire, however, using glass for windows only began in the 7th century CE. The stained glass was used to adorn abbeys, convents and religious buildings. From the Middle Ages on, each architectural style was accompanied by more light and color in stained glass windows. By the Renaissance, stained glass windows served more than an aesthetic avenue. They became teaching tools to tell the stories of the Bible and church history, because most people were unable to read.

The history of Jerusalem's stained glass windows dates back to September 28, 1902, when the Council ordered stained glass windows to replace the colored window glass in the church. In 1924, Memorial Windows also replaced the colored glass windows. (These are the windows we have now). In 1975, the stained glass windows were repaired.

An ad hoc committee was formed to address the needs of keeping the integrity of the stained glass windows. Companies were contacted and the committee visited a church where the work of the selected artisan had completed work.

Beginning in May, Ehrhart Stained Glass, Inc. of York will begin removing one or two windows at a time to repair or enhance the current window. The total cost for this project is \$54,596.00. Congregational Council has approved the use of current memorial funds as well as money from the Carpenter Fund to fund this project. At the same time, it was also felt important for the disciples of Jerusalem to be an important part of this project by gifting funds in memory or in honor of a loved one for a window or portion of a window. There would be an acknowledgement of that gift in the form of a plaque in proximity of the window.

Good morning, Rev. Bonnie M. Oplinger & Members of Jerusalem Congregation,


