

PASTOR PONDERABLES - March 2024

For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God— not the result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life. Ephesians 2:8-10

This passage, read on March 10, is another expression of our Lutheran doctrine that we are "saved by grace through faith alone. During Lent, as we practice our Lenten disciplines of renewal of faith, we might be tempted to think these disciplines, these works, are helping us get to heaven. But as Lutherans, we are always sensitive to anything that would point to our own actions and our own decisions as the cause of our salvation.

So how is your Lent!! Whatever your disciplines are, are they helping you focus on Christ and to treasure this "gift of God" that God has extended to each and all. It is hard to see this gift when we are confronted with life's challenges, and when we are filled with doubt. The Israelites leaving Egypt and in the wilderness were filled with doubt and questioned their survival, and their doubts led them into a den of venomous snakes, intensifying their fears! But Moses lifted up a bronze snake, and all who kept their focus on the bronze snake ahead of them made it through, even if they were bit.

John, in his Gospel, writes, "And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son. Lent should never point us to our own strengths and capacities to overcome our fears, but should point us to Jerusalem, the Cross, the Resurrection, and the power of God. As a congregation worried about the future or as individuals worried about family and friends, our society, our personal future, are we able to keep our eyes on Christ and the promise of life, and again, not based on us but based on this gift of God, the love of God, the grace of Jesus and the community of the Holy Spirit.

It is through faith in Christ, that hope reigns in our lives, and we are led by Christ into a way of life of good works. These works are not for us but for our neighbors. Jerusalem and Brickerville congregations are doing amazing things for our neighbors. The thank you letters from different organizations keep rolling in! The appreciation of our neighbors in need is seen on faces and heard in quiet comments and expressions of gratitude. It is great to be a part of a Spirit led community that is manifests the way of life that Jesus taught us. Despite hardships, despite injuries, we are called to keep our attention on the Son of Man lifted on the cross, and to focus on this gift of forgiveness and the power of God revealed in the resurrection.

We have some great events coming up in March which ends with the Easter celebration.

- We continue with our "Soup, Study, Pray" series about the church in mission: Anne Langdji on March 6; Franklin Ishida on March 13; Chandran Martin on March 20. If you haven't attended please do! We start at 6 pm! Wednesdays! March 6 at Jerusalem, March 13 at Brickerville, and March 20 at Jerusalem.
- There is a concert at Jerusalem on March 10 at 3 pm featuring the Lancaster Chamber Singers.
- Maundy Thursday, March 28, at 7pm, we will worship at Jerusalem
- Good Friday, March 29, at 7pm, we will worship at Brickerville
- Easter Sunday, regular services will be held at each church. There will also be a sunrise service at Brickerville at 6:30 am, followed by a light breakfast.

As much as Lent involves individual disciplines and encourages individual renewal, Lent is also a community journey, with community events and community renewal. Come and join us for these events. I hope your Lent is going well! Pastor Dietrich.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

As we once again remember the final days of Jesus' earthly life and celebrate his resurrection, a number of special musical selections have been planned for the services to be held at Jerusalem Church during Holy Week and on Easter Sunday.

On Palm/ Passion Sunday (March 24), our Jerusalem Choir will sing *On the Cross Have Mercy* by Patrick M. Liebergen. Organ voluntaries will include *Rigaudon* by André Campra, with Jeff Schreiber providing timpani accompaniment, and *Chorale Prelude on "Herzliebster Jesu"* by Johannes Brahms. On Maundy Thursday, the offertory anthem will be *I Give You a New Commandment* by Peter Aston, with Gerald Near's *Prelude on "Ubi caritas et amor"* serving as the prelude.

Our liturgy on Easter Sunday will include several musical highlights. An arrangement for organ and timpani of Jean-Joseph Mouret's *Rondeau* will be offered as the prelude. We will sing a setting for choir and congregation of the assigned psalm for Easter Sunday (verses from Psalm 118), and the choir will sing *All Earth Rejoice with a Gladsome Voice*, an arrangement by Hal H. Hopson of music originally written by Antonio Vivaldi. Timpanist Jeff Schreiber will help to accompany many of the hymns, which will include such favorites as *Jesus Christ Is Risen Today* (*ELW* #365), *The Strife Is O'er, the Battle Done* (*ELW* #366), *Good Christian Friends, Rejoice and Sing* (*ELW* #385), and *The Day of Resurrection* (*ELW* #361). Continuing an annual tradition, Charles-Marie Widor's triumphant *Toccata* from *Symphony No. 5* will conclude our worship.

Invite your family, neighbors, and friends to attend the program of choral music The Lancaster Chamber Singers will perform in our nave on Sunday, March 10, at 3:00 p.m. as part of our 2023-2024 Music at Jerusalem Concert Series. The Lancaster Chamber Singers, directed by Jay W. Risser, have presented quality performances of choral masterpieces in central Pennsylvania since the ensemble's founding in 1978. Consisting of 30 to 35 auditioned vocalists, the group performs throughout Lancaster County and its immediate surroundings, and has also appeared at venues such as the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C., Longwood Gardens, and Bruton Parish Church in Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia, where they presented a concert to help celebrate the 400th anniversary of the founding of Jamestown. Additional information about the ensemble, including video recordings, can be found on their website: lancasterchambersingers.org. A free-will offering will be received during intermission to help defray expenses and support our ongoing Music at Jerusalem Concert Series.

As many of you may know, Jerusalem member Jeanine Schreiber has been singing with The Lancaster Chamber Singers for many years. We extend our sincerest appreciation to her for the assistance she provided in scheduling this concert at Jerusalem Church.
