#### PASTOR'S PONDERABLES

#### IT IS FINISHED

"Remember to finish what I begin." When I was 7 years old, I joined Blue Birds. This was an arm of the girls' organization known as Camp Fire Girls. The Blue Birds had tenets, that is, character building phrases that one recited at the beginning of each meeting. One night we presented these tenets in a program for our parents. The one I shared was, "Remember to finish what I begin." As soon as I finished my speech, my mother called out in front of everyone, "Bonnie needs to remember that one."

"Remember to finish what I begin." Jesus says, "It is finished!" The Greek word means "accomplished." Three words, that can either bring a sigh of relief or a sorrowful reaction. What did Jesus finish? What does "it" stand for? Was he talking about his ministry? That he had finished all his teaching, and preaching, and healing? Was he talking about his life? Here he was, approximately in his early thirties, saying that he was finished living. Did he believe that he had accomplished what Adam, the first man, could not do, and be obedient to his Father's will? Is that what was finally finished? If Jesus was finished, what was he doing being resurrected and returning to his disciples for another 40 days? What was it that Jesus finished?

Jesus is announcing to his Creator and to the crowd that he has completed the work that he was assigned to do from the beginning. Jesus has fulfilled his vocation - his calling - the purpose 2 for which he was born. God and Jesus are united in work and in love. He revealed the truth of God to an often hostile world, knowing that his words and actions could cost him his life.

"It is finished!" Everything prophesied about Him was completed. Salvation is accomplished, redemption is attained through Jesus' death and resurrection. There is nothing that can be added to it. Nothing that we can do that makes His sacrifice better. It is not conditional on our good works, on our baptism, on our church membership. All we can do is to receive it by faith, celebrate it, and live out our lives in response.

There is an Orthodox icon called the Harrowing of Hades. It shows what Jesus is doing when he descends to the dead. He reaches out his hands and pulls Adam and Eve from their graves into a new life with Him, eternally bathed in the presence of God's love. We are Adam and Eve.

In Christ, God did for us what we could not do for ourselves. He only had to do it once. "It is finished!" is what God does, and our only response is to say, "Thank you" and to live the life for which that great sacrifice was accomplished. It is finished tells us that "Salvation is more a matter of cherishing the magnitude of God's love than it is a matter of the forgiveness of sins. We all want this viral pandemic to be finished. But, even in its midst, we are to live this life for which we were born and to be united with God in work and in love, because Jesus said, "It is finished!" Amen.

## FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

## Roger L. Kurtz

As we celebrate Christ's resurrection on April 4<sup>th</sup>, the text of "Awake, My Heart, with Gladness" – found on page 378 of *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* – perfectly captures the transformation of our spirits from Good Friday's sunset of sadness to Easter Sunday's sunrise of gladness. Referring to Jesus' triumph over sin and death, stanza three of the hymn speaks to the assurance felt not only by Christians in general, but also by an author whose earthly life was filled with many trials and tribulations: *This is a sight that gladdens* – what peace it does impart! Now nothing ever saddens the joy within my heart. No gloom shall ever shake, no foe shall ever take, the hope which God's own Son in love for me has won.

Paul Gerhardt (1607-1676) wrote the words to "Awake, My Heart, with Gladness" in 1648. Born near Wittenberg, Germany, he lost both his parents while he was still going to school. Gerhardt studied theology at the University of Wittenberg and became a pastor, serving a Lutheran parish in Mittenwalde and then the great St. Nicolas Church in Berlin. The sunniest period of his professional life was during the early years of his Berlin ministry, when he enjoyed universal love and esteem; however, he was relieved of his duties in 1666 after refusing to comply with a government edict he found contrary to Lutheran doctrine and teachings.

Living during the era of the Thirty Years' War, Gerhardt experienced much distress due to the conflict. In addition, he encountered incredible tragedy in his personal life:- four of his five children died young, and his wife passed away after a prolonged illness while he was unemployed. Sadly, Gerhardt's later years as a widower were spent pastoring what one author called a "rough and unsympathizing people."

Next to Luther, Gerhardt ranks as the most gifted and popular hymn writer of the Lutheran Church. In the history of hymnody, he is considered a transitional figure, writing at a time when hymns were changing from an objective and corporate focus to a more devotional and personal one. Despite the suffering he endured, a remarkable sense of inner peace and strength are found in his texts. Besides "Awake, My Heart, with Gladness," seven other hymns by Gerhardt appear in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*: "O Lord, How Shall I Meet You" (#241), "All My Heart Again Rejoices" (#273), "A Lamb Goes Uncomplaining Forth" (#340), "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded" (#351), "Now Rest Beneath Night's Shadows" (#568), "Evening and Morning" (#761), and "If God My Lord Be for Me" (#788).

Shortly before his death, Gerhardt included the following words as part of a personal testament written to his son. Like the timeless beauty of his hymn texts, they remain relevant and inspirational over three centuries later: *Pray diligently, study something honorable, live peacefully, serve honestly, and remain unmoved in your faith and confessing. If you do this, you too will one day die and depart from this world willingly, joyfully, and blessedly.*

#### WHAT IS A HYBRID CHURCH?

If we didn't learn enough new words attached to concepts as the result of a viral pandemic, the Christian church is moving forward in various ways to be the Body of Christ in this time of keeping ones distance for safety's sake. To that end, Jerusalem is experimenting with a virtual worship service (and other meeting times) in the least intrusive way possible.

He invited us to participate virtually in their worship service for the past few Sundays. He has had different ones of us participate, even though they are two hours away. You have received invitations to join in their worship service if you have a computer. Council members who are computer-less had a phone number to call to join in the service. The disciples at St. Mark's have been very welcoming of us in our participation in their worship.
